WHY DEMOCRACY MATTERS

ALEXIS DE TOCQUEVILLE'S "DEMOCRACY IN AMERICA"

DR. PATRICK OVEREEM VRIJE UNIVERSITEIT IN AMSTERDAM, THE NETHERLANDS Led by Dr. Overeem, this course will explore how modern democracy was built and why it matters. For centuries, monarchy and aristocracy were favored over democracy, whose dominance is recent. Alexis de Tocqueville (1805-1859) studied it in the U.S., writing *Democracy in America*, an analysis still relevant today. This course explores his work to understand democracy's current challenges and its global impact.

St. Augustine's *Confessions* explore timeless questions freedom, truth, meaning—amid profound historical change. This course offers a guided reading of his work, uncovering its enduring relevance and insights into human nature, faith, and the search for ultimate purpose through seminar discussions and analysis.

BEING FREE IN A BROKEN WORLD

A PHILOSOPHICAL-LITERARY EXPLORATION ON MODERNITY

DR. DIEGO I. ROSALES HÁPAX. RESEARCH CENTER FOR THE HUMANITIES This course explores philosopher Gabriel Marcel's distinction between "problems" and "mysteries." While modern thought seeks to solve everything, turning it into a problem, some realities—love, suffering, faith—demand deeper reflection, as they are "mysteries". Through readings from Marcel and literary works by Borges, Poe, Dostoevsky, and others, we will examine how mystery enriches our search for truth, goodness, and beauty.



WHO SHOULD ATTEND?


The Phoenix Institute seeks students who are a good fit for our unique community. Here's what we look for:
